WHAT DOES A TOTAL FIRE BAN MEAN?

It means a person must not:

- . All open solid fuel fires for the purpose of cooking or camping
- . Use of incinerators and other activities (as described in the ‘What Can’t I do on a Total Fire Ban day?’ section).

WHEN WILL A TOTAL FIRE BAN BE DECLARED?

They are declared on days when fires will be difficult to control, are most likely to threaten lives and property, or when widespread fires are impacting the availability of resources. The decision to put a ban in place is based on the weather forecast. DFES consults with the Bureau of Meteorology to determine when dangerous fire weather conditions are likely. DFES also consults with local governments that will be affected. The need for the ban to remain is assessed and may be revoked in the morning if weather conditions ease. The status of a ban should be checked after 6pm each day.
